WHAT'S NEXT FOR OUR CHURCH AND THE CONGREGATION?

Depending on whether you are a glass half empty or half full person, might decide if you think we are a ship without a captain, or we have a fabulous opportunity for our church to grow even more. We should talk in our small groups and talk as a congregation so that when candidates are interviewed, we start to see which one fills the needs of the church.

When Rev. Tina applied, some of us had to fight for a women minister. This time it will be other barriers to climb over, but as long as we are praying, God will hear our needs.

As Presbyterians. we do not have our ministers appointed, but we chose them which puts a big responsibility on the congregation to be a part of the process. It behooves us to come to church and have our voices heard. God is listening.

WHAT'S NEXT FOR THE BUSINESS SIDE OF THE CHURCH?

Many people do not like to think of the business side of the church, but without money the staff does not get paid, bills pile up, nothing is given for charity, and new projects do not get done.

If a ministerial candidate does his or her due-diligence, they will be looking at how much money is in the bank, what our expenses are, and how much we have to spend.

When I came back here 20 years ago, I was asked to be on the PNC. (Pulpit Nominating Committee) I said, "Maybe, if I knew what a PNC was." I thought it was a bank. After it was explained, I said yes.

Then I saw the finances, and I could not believe them. Every month, we robbed from Peter to pay Paul. Who would be paid, and who would have to wait? We started a garage sale to help pay bills.

Eventually after deciding on Rev. Tina, our ship started to right itsself. Rev. Tina preached about tithing, and we got on a good financial footing. We need to continue our tithing and giving because God says we should.



NATIVE PLANT CULTIVARS PROS AND CONS

Recently I read a very interesting article in *Horticulture Magazine* about native flowers but with new cultivars, and it talked about how some attract bees and butterflies and others don't.

I was working in one of my flower gardens one day, and I saw first hand what they were talking about. I have an old fashion cone flower that is a dusty pink. It is not nearly as attractive as some of the newer flowers that I have in the garden. In fact, I have much prettier coneflowers in bright pink, orange, and purple. I watched as bee after bee flew close to the brighter coneflowers only to fly on by and land on the dusty pink one. Not one bee got on the new flowers, and the butterflies did not even bother with them.

Some of the newer cultivars are like tomatoes in the winter. They look bright red, are solid, but they have no taste. Another example is roses. My mother's old fashion roses spread their fragrances all over the yard. It was as if we were at the perfume counter. Many of the newer roses have little or no smell. They might as well be made of silk. They are beautiful, but they do little for the bees and butterflies.

So which do we plant—new or old cultivars? The answer is both. The newer plants are pleasant or our eyes, and the old standbys are a smorgasbord for the hummingbirds, bees, and butterflies.

Planning for autumn helps to make all of the jobs such as racking leaves, cutting back plants, planting new plants, and taking out diseased ones easier. You don't have to take a whole day for fall work. It is amazing how much can be done in 30-60 minutes.

Break down the jobs into doable segments. Even kids appreciate quick jobs. Of course the weather does not always cooperate when the fall rains start, so make the most of the sunshine. (Oh, I forgot we are in the Pittsburgh area, and God thought we would love cloudy days.)

I fell in love with Asian lilies this year and plan to plant more this spring. They are perennial bulbs that bloom in July. They are very fragrant with most blossoms in shades of pink or white. Some even have double blossoms which are the ones I like.

The first year that they bloomed, I was not impressed. They were about 2 feet high and had small blossoms. The second year they were 4-5 feet tall and had a whole bouquet at the end of each thick stem. They take no work, look good, and are attractive to bees, butterflies, and hummingbirds.

We are up to 6 Mason bee boxes. We love watching them, and they fly around us but never sting.
